At Van Meter. Bookfest became an instant sensation as it provided an opportunity for the librarian, teachers, and administration to support learning in a collaborative and student-led format.

"I was thrilled when I learned about Kwame Alexander Bookfest and how it would be used here at Van Meter Community School," said Cody Tibbetts, elementary principal. "When I saw the available titles, I knew the collection would give students great topics to read and discuss."

Teachers agreed. Katie Flaws, a fifth-grade instructor, dove right into Bookfest as soon as she received the titles. Flaws quickly realized it would reveal new teaching and learning experiences she hadn't previously seen in her classroom.

Miller and Flaws collaborated early on a plan they felt would immediately engage the students.

"We kicked it off by sharing book trailers and the background of each book," Miller shared. "I put these resources together in a fun choice board and made it into a poster to put with the books while the kids decided which one they wanted to read. Katie and I kicked it off together with her fifth graders by having them vote for which book they wanted to read. It was so much fun to see Katie get the kids excited by announcing the book clubs and having them get their book."

Both Flaws and Miller used the **Bookfest Discussion Guides** extensively. "I love the questions and how these are laid out for our book clubs." Miller said. "It evoked wonderful conversations

and gave our students ways to make connections to the characters and stories."

Overall. Bookfest has been a fun. motivating, and thought-provoking experience for educators and students alike at Van Meter. "The feedback from my staff and students has been positive, and the fact that it has encouraged reading is a testimonial in itself," said principal Tibbetts.

"Connection, conversation, and community are what come to mind when I reflect on my Bookfest experience," Flaws said. "The questions were open-ended, giving students the space and place to share their unique ideas. Best of all, though, it brought my students and me closer together. We read together, we shared emotions together, and we built a love of reading together. It truly was a remarkable experience."

Embedded in these new reading adventures, according to Flaws, were exciting new titles for both her and her fifth graders to discover. "I was able to share ideas, emotions, and reactions alongside my students," Flaws said. "Kwame's books The Crossover and Front Desk acted as windows and mirrors for my students. Bookfest encouraged students to make connections with the characters while simultaneously developing empathy for others as they put themselves in the characters' shoes."

According to Miller, Bookfest gave her new tools that support her goals as a librarian. "The list included so many titles and authors that I couldn't wait to share with our students. The titles available are perfect for our readers -

there is something for everyone," she said. "Our students can choose from all different types of genres, including fiction, graphic novels, nonfiction, biographies, and more. This supports my mission as their school librarian because I want all readers to have choice and voice within our library and within their life as a reader."
